ROLLESTON SCHOOL (3488) Enrolment Scheme

Effective from 1/01/2021

The guidelines for development and operation of enrolment schemes are issued under section 11G (3) of the Education Act 1989 for the purpose of describing the basis on which the Secretary's powers in relation to enrolment schemes will be exercised.

Home Zone

All students who live within the home zone described below shall be eligible to enrol at the school.

The Enrolment Scheme takes addresses on both sides of the boundary roads mentioned in the description, unless otherwise stated.

Starting from the intersection of Rolleston Drive and Brookside Road;

- South-East on Rolleston Drive to Rembrandt Drive
- South-East on Rembrandt Drive to Michelangelo Drive
- North-East on Michelangelo Drive to Tennyson Street
- South-East on Tennyson Street to Lowes Road
- North-East on the northern side only Lowes Road to Levi Road
- North-East on the northern side only of Levi Road to Weedons Road
- North on the Western side of Weedons Road to the Southern Motorway (SH1)
- West on the southern side of the Southern Motorway (SH1) to Main South Road (SH1)
- West on the southern side of Main South Road (SH1) to 81 Main South Road
- South to the north-west end of Elizabeth Street
- South-East on Elizabeth Street to Brookside Road
- South-West on Brookside Road to Rolleston Drive o Including George Street

Proof of residence within the home zone will be required.

Each year, applications for enrolment in the following year from in-zone students will be sought by a date that will be published in a daily or community newspaper circulating in the area served by the school. This will enable the board to assess the number of places that can be made available to students who live outside the home zone.

Special Programmes

This priority category is not applicable at this school because the school does not run a Special programme approved by the Secretary.

Transitional Arrangements

For families of currently enrolled students whose addresses become "out of zone" due to this amendment to the enrolment scheme home zone:

The following addresses shall be deemed to be "in-zone", but only for as long as they contain children who, at the time of enrolment, are the siblings of current students.

NB This is a very tightly defined concession. It would not apply to:

- A. Children of parents who move in to any of these addresses after the adoption of the enrolment scheme boundary amendment; and
- B. Children of parents currently living at one of the addresses who move out of the address after the adoption of the enrolment scheme boundary amendment.

Section11E of the Education Act 1989 states that "a state school's home zone must be defined by geographic boundaries; and must be described in such a way that any given address is either within or outside the home zone." The list above is defining a location as "in-zone" unless dictated otherwise by the exceptions outlined in A and B above.

Out of Zone Enrolments

Each year the Board of Trustees will determine the number of places which are likely to be available in the following year for the enrolment of students who live outside the home zone. The Board will publish this information by notice in a daily or community newspaper circulating in the area served by the school. The notice will indicate how applications are to be made and will specify a date by which all applications must be received.

Applications for enrolments will be processed in the following order of priority:

- **First priority** is not applicable at this school because the school does not run a special programme approved by the Secretary for Education.
- Second priority must be given to applicants who are siblings of current students.
- Third priority must be given to applicants who are siblings of former students.
- Fourth priority must be given to any applicant who is a child of a former student of the school.
- **Fifth priority** must be given to any applicant who is either a child of an employee of the board of the school or a child of a member of the board of the school.
- Sixth priority must be given to all other applicants.

If there are more applicants in the second, third, fourth, fifth or sixth priority groups than there are places available, selection within the priority group will be by ballot conducted in accordance with instructions by the Secretary, under Section 11G (1) on the Education Act 1989. Parents will be informed of the date of any ballot by notice in a daily or community newspaper circulating in the area served by the school.

Applicants seeking second or third priority status may be required to give proof of a sibling relationship.

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
